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## Question 1

The straight line $l_{1}$ passes through the points with coordinates $(5,1,6)$ and $(2,2,1)$.
a) Find a vector equation of $l_{1}$.

A different straight line $l_{2}$ passes though the point $C(6,6,-4)$ and is parallel to the vector $4 \mathbf{i}-2 \mathbf{j}+3 \mathbf{k}$.
b) Show clearly that $l_{1}$ and $l_{2}$ are skew.

## Question 2

A non invertible transformation in three dimensional space is defined by the following $3 \times 3$ matrix, where $a$ is a scalar constant.

$$
\mathbf{A}=\left(\begin{array}{rrr}
a & 1 & 2 \\
2 & -1 & a \\
3 & a & 4
\end{array}\right)
$$

Determine the possible values of $a$.

## Question 3

Sketch on a standard Argand diagram the locus of the points $z$ which satisfy

$$
|z-4-4 i|=2 \sqrt{2},
$$

and use it to prove that

$$
\frac{1}{12} \pi \leq \arg z \leq \frac{5}{12} \pi
$$

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## Question 4

Use standard results on summations to show that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\sum_{n=1}^{k}\left(18 n^{2}+28 n+5\right) \equiv k(k+2)(6 k+11) \tag{7}
\end{equation*}
$$

## Question 5

The equation of a plane $\Pi$ is given by

$$
\mathbf{r}=\left(\begin{array}{l}
1 \\
2 \\
1
\end{array}\right)+\lambda\left(\begin{array}{l}
2 \\
1 \\
0
\end{array}\right)+\mu\left(\begin{array}{l}
1 \\
0 \\
2
\end{array}\right),
$$

where $\lambda$ and $\mu$ are parameters.

The plane $\Pi$ is transformed to the plane $\Pi^{\prime}$ by the matrix

$$
\mathbf{A}=\left(\begin{array}{lll}
1 & 0 & 2 \\
1 & 1 & 0 \\
1 & 2 & 1
\end{array}\right)
$$

Find a Cartesian equation of $\Pi^{\prime}$.

## Question 6

Solve the following equation.

$$
z^{2}=21-20 \mathrm{i}, \quad z \in \mathbb{C} .
$$

Give the answers in the form $a+b \mathrm{i}$, where $a \in \mathbb{R}$ and $b \in \mathbb{R}$.

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## Question 7

Prove by mathematical induction that if $n$ is a positive integer then $5^{n-1}+11^{n}$ is always divisible by 6 .

## Question 8



The figure above shows part of the graph of the curve with equation $y=\frac{x^{2}}{1-x^{2}}$, which passes through the origin $O$.

The finite area bounded by the curve, the $y$ axis and the straight line with equation $y=3$, is to be revolved in the $\boldsymbol{y}$ axis by $360^{\circ}$ to form a solid of revolution $S$.

Find an exact value for the volume of $S$.

## Question 9

Find the image of the circle with equation

$$
x^{2}+y^{2}=4,
$$

under the transformation represented by the $2 \times 2$ matrix $\left(\begin{array}{ll}2 & 3 \\ 2 & 4\end{array}\right)$.

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## Question 10

$$
x^{3}-4 x^{2}+2 x-5=0
$$

are denoted in the usual notation by $\alpha, \beta$ and $\gamma$.

Show that the cubic equation whose roots are

$$
\frac{\beta \gamma}{\alpha}, \frac{\gamma \alpha}{\beta} \text { and } \frac{\alpha \beta}{\gamma},
$$

is given by

$$
\begin{equation*}
5 x^{3}+36 x^{2}+60 x-25=0 . \tag{9}
\end{equation*}
